## Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends,

My thoughts and prayers are with each of you. The power of our traditions, our community and our beliefs will guide us through these times.

Let me share with you more about how our community is able to pray, and how we aren't, during the quarantine. It reminds us about the irreplaceable nature of being together as a congregation.

As I hold, online screening does not count as a *minyan*, as a *minyan* is only when people are in physical proximity to each other. This means that obligatory prayers, such as the *Amidah*, cannot be chanted as they would be were a *minyan* present. One's response "amen" to such prayers were another person leading them remotely, would not be sufficient to fulfill one's own obligations to pray. During this time, one must say one's prayers as an individual, which of course has always been the rule when a *minyan* is not accessible.

It has been rewarding to hear from so many who took part in Tyler Stickelman's beautiful *Bar Mitzvah* service. The same is true for our Friday night *Kabbalat Shabbat* services and the others we have had. In every case, we are reciting prayers and blessings that are not in the category of "obligatory" for the reasons explained above. Reciting the psalms of *Kabbalat Shabbat*, or passages from the Torah or *Haftarah*, or reciting individual blessings that occur based on circumstances that arise (such as eating something which we needn't do at any particular time) are allowed even remotely.

Hence, during his *Bar Mitzvah*, Tyler recited the blessing for the *tallit* because he was putting on a *tallit*. He and the

others who participated recited the blessing for studying Torah, because by chanting or listening to the chanting, they were studying Torah.

Why is this the case? Firstly, since telephones were invented, the ruling is that someone listening over the phone but not present does not count for a *minyan*. Similarly, the technology we currently employ also doesn't allow for us to count people far away for a *minyan*.

But even more importantly is that our prayers and all our observances are not "logical" where the answer is, "Oh, we'll just have a Zoom meeting instead." Prayers are poetry, they are art, they are mysterious, they are holy. Such things require us to be with each other because that is where their spirit lives. While gathering and joining in singing together and engaging in Torah together are vitally necessary to us, the prayers which we say when gathered in a *minyan* we say to God in the way the rabbis have told us God wants them recited. God, so we believe, is "fine" with our not having *minyanim* and praying as individuals, and so that is what we are doing now.

This then points us to the powerful and positive experience all this teaches. I firmly believe that when we are able to gather together again, the meaning of all this will strike everyone as obviously right. The energy, the emotion, the sense of common purpose we will feel when once again united I know will be unforgettable for us. It is with anticipation of that moment that we must stay courageous and true and tolerate the current circumstances and their limitations, so that the "magic" of being together is not diminished.

Please do participate in all the classes, prayer opportunities and other gatherings that NSJC will be offering, as these we cannot live without. And gain strength and hope when you think of the time when we are together again to lift up our voices in prayer as a *minyan* - as more than a *minyan*.




Hush by Eishes Chayil


We are certainly living in unprecedented times. Who would ever have thought that we'd be teaching our Religious School

#### Shalom Keren!

On April 12, *chol hamoed Pesach*, our JLC students were able to Zoom with our Israeli *Shinshinit* (*Shin-Shin* for short) Keren Or Kadosh.

Shin-Shin is a one-year voluntary service program for Israeli high school graduates prior to their service in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). Keren worked with all the students in our Jewish Learning Center to foster their connection to and love for Israel! This is the second year that our JLC earned a grant to sponsor a *Shin-Shin*'s involvement in our school. This program came to us through the Jewish Agency, the Sid Jacobson JCC, Masorti (Israeli Conservative Judaism) and the UJA.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the program was cut short and in March, all of the *Shinshinit* in the United States were sent back to Israel, to permit them to quarantine for two weeks before returning to their families in time for Passover.

### "Finding Family: My Yichus"

Yichus is the Hebrew word for lineage or pedigree. The Torah and our daily prayers are replete with references to members of our ancient genealogical tree as it winds through biblical time. In Judaism, there is an obligation to honor your mother and father. Exploring your personal family history, especially in our generation which is not so far removed from the Holocaust, can reveal the fortitude and courage of your relatives and connect your soul more strongly to Judaism.

The following is an abbreviated version of my journey to seek the roots of my father's family. My goal here is to inspire you to seek out your family history, not only for the immense personal fulfillment it can bring, but also to enable you to pass on your yichus to the next generation.

The process of unraveling my family's legacy has been a

fascinating journey. You experience an incredible feeling of accomplishment each time you learn something new about your family. For me it has been finding cousins in Alaska, Australia, France, Israel and Sweden. I discovered books written by my relatives describing their experiences during the Holocaust. I am

grandfather (1846-1918) not an expert genealogist. I have no formal training. What I do have is a deep curiosity about my ancestors. I am driven to ask questions and search for answers by interviewing relatives and utilizing the amazing genealogical databases and tools available on the internet.

In 1983, I spoke with my father's aunt, Bella Kurtzbard, one of my first and most important interviews. Aunt Bella, a Polish immigrant to Canada, helped bring her parents, Tilla Gela & Mattis Kurtzbard, and brother, Harry (my grandfather), to Toronto. She could only tell me a bit about her other siblings, as she was separated from six of them when she left for Canada in 1920, aboard the SS Grampian. Not knowing about these six relatives bothered me, I had an intense interest in learning their fate. This curiosity has led me on a 40-year journey to reconnect with as many of my family members as possible.

While on this genealogical journey, a pattern of discovery repeatedly emerged. I would first uncover a seemingly random family fact. After holding onto that fact for a while, even years, a new piece of information would suddenly appear, allowing that fact to fall into a sensible place.

For example, during that 37-year-old interview with Aunt Bella, she mentioned that we had relatives in New York City, Helen & Pinchas Kurzbard. I had been searching for these people since 1983, as I had moved

to New York. Combing through the Ellis Island database, I eventually found a ship manifest listing Pincus Kurzbard, his wife, Helen, and young Irv, who traveled from a displaced person's camp in Germany to New York in 1947. Seven years ago, I sent email inquiries to as many Kurzbards as I could find, asking if they knew of Helen and Pincus. I had

forgotten about those emails when, five years later, I received an email from Margie Kurzbard in Alaska. She wrote that her husband Harvey's father's name was Pincus Kurzbard. They were a bit apprehensive when I first spoke with them until I asked about the color of his mother's hair (I knew from family lore that she had red hair). When they replied, "Red," that started the ball rolling. Later the connection was verified by a DNA test that showed we were close cousins. My "new" cousins were astounded by this revelation. They thought they had no relatives, believing all of their family was lost in the Holocaust.

Another story made me further appreciate the impact World War II and the Holocaust had on my family. Just before the war, Aunt Bella was selected, through a family lottery, to travel to a wedding in France as a representative of our Canadian relatives. While visiting there her nephew, Jacques Rosenberg, a little boy at that time, became enamored of Bella and did not want her to return to Canada after the wedding.

So, as the story goes, Jacques hid my aunt's ticket and passport. Bella was frantic. She went to the shipping continued on page 7

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office to try to obtain an extension to stay longer in Paris. An official explained, in an exasperated tone, that if she did not get on that ship now he could not guarantee she would ever be able to leave France due to the impending war. Through research I was able to locate the ship's manifest and discovered that Aunt Bella sailed on the *Île de France* on September 9, 1939, the last passenger ship to leave France before World War II began.

I also learned that in the years prior to the war, members of my extended family from Poland tried to enter Canada through France. Many had to stay in France, as Canada had restricted European Jewish immigration. I have been able to connect with those cousins and their descendants, some who continued to live in France and others who emigrated to Australia and Sweden. I uncovered stories about their lives in France during WWII. Some perished, others found precarious refuge in the French countryside. I felt overwhelmed when I realized that these people, heroes, who are all part of my family tree, endured

many narrow escapes, became partisans or risked their lives for their children so that they could survive while devastation was all around them. I have spoken with my cousins who are children of these Holocaust survivors and I have read their parents' stories.

For years I was haunted by a photo (top right) inherited from Aunt Bella. Who were those three children? Using internet tools I was able to track them down in Australia and learned that we share great grandparents, Tilla

Gela and Mattis Kurtzbard. The Grynberg family lived in France during WWII. Their father, Solomon, was deported when the country was invaded by Germany and did not survive. After the war, their mother, Ida, was in financial distress. To help her family, she sent her three children to homes set up for children in need. (They were sponsored (adopted) by a New York City company, E-Z-On Maternity Clothes.) We have become very close with the youngest sibling, Danielle, (who resembles my grandmother!) and her husband, Stephen.

Here are specific things you can do to find your own family heroes and build a family tree, to connect with unknown relatives and to uncover your heritage. It is especially important to do the research as a family and to involve your children. Children are open to learning about their history and they will become the keepers of your family legacy. Make history come alive for young people by encouraging them to help develop a set of questions to seek answers to what you are most interested in learning.

Bring these questions to family elders and enlist their help in reconstructing your family heritage. Do not wait! I wish I had asked a lot more questions of and recorded a lot more answers from relatives who are no longer alive. Elder family members can identify people in photographs and verify family lore. Be sure to digitize photographs with accompanying explanations. I cannot tell you how difficult it is to identify people in long forgotten photographs.

With your newfound family information in hand, explore the variety of genealogy websites available, both Jewish and non-Jewish (see

below). Build your family tree through online websites. You will be surprised how DNA analysis may lead to new connections and can help verify relationships. Websites will connect to other online family trees that might match up with people on your tree. I have been astounded by the way the internet has facilitated my search. With your children involved, take advantage of the range of technological resources.

I often reflect on the hundreds of

relatives I have found all over the world. I imagine how our family might have celebrated Jewish holidays over 100 years ago in our town of origin, Konskie, Poland (Kinsk in Yiddish).

My goal has been to learn about my *yichus* in order to reunite our family. Although it's not possible for all of us to be physically together, I am grateful that technology has enabled us to discover one another and reconnect.

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My wife, Melissa, and I visited cousins in Australia, Canada and the United States. We even held two family reunions: in Melbourne, Australia in 2019 and in New York City in 2020.

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

### Defensive Driving Teaching Opportunity

Men's Club Board member **Fred Graff** will be stepping down from his Defensive Driving (DD) course responsibilities after over 20 years of organizing and seven years of teaching the course.
